# Speakers



**Maria Adriana Cardoso**  
Engineer

Maria Adriana Cardoso is a research fellow at the Hydraulics and Environment Department of the LNEC, Portugal's national civil engineering laboratory. She is the author or co-author of more than 160 publications. She has collaborated in more than 60 national and international research, development and innovation projects and contributes to LNEC's representation, consultancy, and knowledge transfer activities.

Her applied research focuses on urban water management, including modelling and monitoring, performance assessment, and safety planning. For European project RESCCUE, which brings together cities and research organizations, Maria Adriana Cardoso co-created the «Resilience Assessment Framework», a multidimensional assessment tool.



**Stéphane Hallegatte**  
Economist

Since September 2012, Stéphane Hallegatte has been a senior economist at the Climate Change Group of the World Bank. He had previously worked in research for ten years, at Météo-France, CIRED (International Center for Research on Environment and Development) and Stanford University. He contributed to France's first Climate Change Adaptation Plan and to the IPCC's 5th Assessment Report, as lead author in Working Group II «Impacts, Adaptation and Vulnerability».

His areas of research and expertise are environmental economics and green growth, climate change (mitigation and adaptation), risk management and decision-making under uncertainty.

**Dominique Méda**  
Philosopher and sociologist

Dominique Méda is Professor of Sociology and Director of IRISSO (Interdisciplinary Research Institute in Social Sciences) at Paris-Dauphine University, as well as chair of “Ecology, Work, and Employment” at the College of World Studies. Before that, she had worked in the French administration and publishing.

For more than 25 years, she has been questioning the place of work in societies, of women in employment, the linkages between economy and politics, and indicators of wealth. Her work today focuses on territorial conversions, the end of growth, and ecological and social transition.



**Mark Pelling**  
Geographer

Mark Pelling is Professor of Geography and chairman of the Centre for Integrated Research on Risk and Resilience at King’s College London. His research focuses on the social and institutional factors of vulnerability, mainly in urban Africa and Asia, and on the linkages between development, resilience, and transformation in the context of environmental change.

Mark Pelling is lead coordinating author for the IPCC’s 6th Assessment Report and the Special Report on Disaster Risk Management (SREX report). He is also currently working at United Kingdom Research and Innovation (UKRI) as the Resilience Theme Leader for a fund dedicated to research on the challenges of developing countries.

**Serge Tisseron**  
Psychologist and psychiatrist

Serge Tisseron is an associate researcher at the Psychoanalysis, Medicine and Society Research Centre of Paris-Diderot University. He is an expert on how digital technologies and robotics are changing our relationships to others, to ourselves, to time, space, and knowledge. Also interested in disaster-related trauma, he created the Institute for the History and Memory of Disasters (IHMEC) in 2008, and in 2012 he set up the website [memoiredescatastrophes.org](http://memoiredescatastrophes.org).

Serge Tisseron is the author of the book titled *Resilience* published by the Presses Universitaires de France. It touches on the question of social connections as a factor of individual resilience and on the idea of collective resilience.
